inemen serve on the front lines of our nation's energy needs, and in April we honor the men and women who work in challenging conditions to keep the lights on. We proudly recognize linemen for the services they perform around the clock in difficult conditions to keep power flowing.



The work can be heavy, in more ways than one. Did you know the equipment and tools that a lineman carries while climbing a utility pole can weigh up to 50 pounds? That's the same as carrying six gallons of water. Speaking of utility poles, line workers are required to climb poles ranging anywhere from 30 to 120 feet tall. Needless to say, if you have a fear of heights, this likely isn't the career path for you.

Linemen must be committed to their career-because it's not just a job, it's a lifestyle. The long hours and ever-present danger can truly take a toll. In fact, being a lineman is listed in the top 10 most dangerous jobs in the U.S.

Lineworkers often work non-traditional hours, outdoors in difficult conditions. While the job does not require a college degree, it does require technical skills, years of training and hands-on learning. Did you know that to become a journeyman lineworker can take more than 7,000 hours of training (or about four years)? That's because working with high-voltage equipment requires specialized skills, experience and an ongoing mental toughness. Shortcuts are not an option, and there is no room for error in this line of work.

Despite the many challenges, CKEC's lineworkers are committed to powering our local community. During severe weather events that bring major power outages, lineworkers are among the first ones called. They must be ready to leave the comfort of their home and families

unexpectedly, and they don't return until the job is done, often days later. That's why the lineworker's family is also dedicated to service. They understand the importance of the job to the community.

CKEC lineworkers are responsible for keeping power flowing 24/7, 365 days a year. To do this, they maintain 7,843 miles of power lines across ten counties. In addition to the highly visible tasks lineworkers perform, their job today goes far beyond climbing utility poles to repair a wire. Today's lineworkers are information experts who can pinpoint power outages from miles away. Line crews now use laptops, tablets, drones and other technologies to map outages, survey damage and troubleshoot problems.

Being a lineworker may not seem like a glamorous job, but it is absolutely essential to the life of our community. Without the exceptional dedication and commitment of these hardworking men and women, we simply would not have the reliable electricity that we need for everyday life. Linemen are at the heart of everything we do.

Tthe next time you see a lineworker, please thank them for the work they do to keep power flowing, regardless of the time of day or weather. Lineworkers are the power behind your power.



BE THUNDERSTORM **AWARE**

Lightning is a leading cause of injury and death from weather related hazards. Although most lightning victims survive, people struck by lightning often report long-term, debilitating symptoms. Thunderstorms are dangerous storms that can inlcude lightning, hail, powerful winds over 50 MPH, cause flash flooding and can produce tornadoes.

If you are in a thunderstorm warning, find safe shelter and follow these tips:

- When thunder roars, go indoors.
- Move from outdoors into a building or a car.
- Pay attention to alerts and warnings.
- Unplug appliances,
- Do not use landline phones.

You can pepare now:

- Create an emergency plan so you and your family know what to do, where to go and what you will need to protect yourselves.
- Sign up for your community's warning system. The Emergency Alert System and National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration Weather Radio also provide emergency alerts.
- Identify nearby, sturdy buildings close to where you live, work, study and play.

Jiggs Smokehouse


A meat lovers paradise

ttled in the heart of western Oklahoma, Jiggs Smokehouse has earned an outstanding worldwide reputation for their tasty BBQ and heaping helpings. Located three miles west of Clinton off Interstate 40, Jiggs is open Tuesday-Friday, 11 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Jigg's Smokehouse has been smokin' barbecue for Oklahomans for over 40 years. Built in the 1970's as a smokehouse, not a restaurant, Jiggs Botchlett used it as an outlet for his turkey and egg farms.

In the year 2000, George's youngest son Lynn and his wife Becky bought the business. Lynn and Becky along with their three children Ashley, Carson and Rachel and their adopted work family continue to keep the history and tradition of Jiggs



Smokehouse alive. The business continues to grow as each generation of customers and friends continue to share their secret lil BBQ Shack, that lil' ole hole in the wall.

Located along Route 66 just outside of Clinton, Jiggs hits the mark with plenty of charm. The carefree place has pieces of history hanging on the walls in their cozy dining room. You won't find white tablecloths or real plates, but the lighthearted place is always full of happy customers.



Jiggs knows what it does well, with just seven main items on the menu with a few side items. Stop by to taste the BBQ beef sandwich, a local favorite that comes with succulent, fall apart brisket with a splash of Jigg's sweet and spicy BBQ sauce. Small Change, **Big** Difference!

n Tuesday, February 8, the **CKenergy Electric Foundation** Board approved a total of \$32,400 for grants this quarter. Those funds will be used to improve the livelihood of individuals, fund school programs, help local law enforcement better protect citizens, and so much more!

Giving to those in need is a great way to tap into the Oklahoma spirit and thousands of Oklahoma's electric co-op members do just that by donating funds through Operation Round Up.

As a member of CKenergy Electric Cooperative, you have the opportunity to participate in the Operation Round Up program. The program works by allowing co-op members to round up their monthly electric bills to the nearest dollar amount. The spare change is transferred to CKenergy's Operation Round Up fund and dispersed to local charitable causes.

For example, let's say you have a monthly electric bill of \$84.62. The bill is rounded up to a flat \$85, with the additional 38 cents going into the Operation Round Up Fund. On average, a co-op member donates roughly \$6 each year. Seems like a small amount, right? It is, but when multiplied by thousands of other CKenergy members, Operation Round Up raises thousands of dollars for local causes and organizations.

Operation Round Up funds are used to address important local needs. Local charities, youth groups, schools, fire departments, senior citizen's centers and food banks are just a few of the beneficiaries of Round Up funds. Funds are also used to help needy individuals and families pay for medical equipment and other needs.

CKenergy Electric Cooperative is passionate about the communities we serve. Together, electric co-ops with Operation Round Up programs in place have raised more than \$100 million since 1989.

Grants are decided by a twelve-member board of cooperative members who volunteer their time to oversee the program. CKenergy Electric co-op coordinator is Boyd Lee. Requests for assistance are reviewed and evaluated quarterly throughout the year.

We hope you will continue to participate in CKenergy's Operation Round Up. Your small change will change lives, and together we will make a big difference right here in Oklahoma.

Next quarter grant applications must be submitted no later than May 3, 2022. Any applications received after the due date will be on the agenda for the next scheduled meeting.

Know What's Below

Steps for Safe Digging

pring is just around the corner, and there's never been a better time to get outside and enjoy the fresh air. Perhaps you're making plan for a new garden or a lawn makeover. However you're planning to revamp your backyard oasis, remember to keep safety in mind for all projects—especially those that require digging near underground utility lines.

Most of us never think about the electric, gas, water and other utility lines buried below the ground, but hitting one of these lines while digging is not the reminder you'll want-trust us! CKEC reminds all members who are planning a digging project to call 811 at least three business days before you start. Or you can submit request online at www.call811.com. Here's how the process works.

After you call 811 or submit your request online, all affected utilities will be notified of your intent to dig. It may

take the utilities a few days to get to your request, so please be patient. The affected utilities will send someone out to mark the buried lines with paint or flags. You're not even required to be present while your project site is marked.

Before you break ground, confirm that all the utilities have responded to your request. If you placed your request by phone, use the process explained by your 811 call center representative. If you submitted your request online, refer to your 811 center ticket to confirm everything.

By taking this important step before you break ground on your project, you can help protect not only yourself, but your community. You can dig with confidence, because you'll know how to avoid any damage to underground utility lines. Disrupting an underground utility line can interrupt service, cause injuries and cost money to repair, so remember to call 811 first and know what's below.

Shrimp Tacos

Ingredients:

1 jalapeno, sliced

Slaw

½ head green cabbage, thinly sliced 1/2 head purple cabbage, thinly sliced ½ cup whole milk ½ cup mayonnaise 1 Tbs. sugar 1 tsp. white vinegar 1/4 tsp. cayenne pepper 1/4 tsp. kosher salt ½ bunch fresh cilantro, roughly chopped



Shrimp

2 Tbs. vegetable oil 11/2 lbs. peeled and deveined shrimp 16-ounce can Mexican tomato sauce or enchilada sauce 1/2 tsp. ground cumin 1 Tbs. butter

Directions:

For the slaw: Combine the sliced jalapeno and shredded green and purple cabbage in a large bowl. In a separate bowl, mix the milk, mayonnaise, sugar, vinegar, cayenne, and salt. Pour the milk mixture over the cabbage and jalapeno and toss to combine. Before serving, toss in the cilantro.

For the shrimp: Heat the oil in a heavy skillet over high heat. Throw in the shrip and cook, tossing it around, until opaque, 2 to 3 minutes. Reduce the heat to low and poul in the tomato or enchilada suace, stirring to combine. Stir in the cumin and cook for another 1 to 2 minutes. Add the butter, then remove from the heat.

Serve warm tortillas with the shrimp, slaw, pico de gallo, avocado slices, sour cream and pepper jack cheese, then let everyone build their own tacos.
