

CKEC 2022 PROPOSED BYLAW CHANGES Vote and Register July 10-12

he CKenergy Board of Trustees would like to propose a few bylaw enhancements to the membership; below is a summary as well as the actual changes in red.

The changes to the nomination and election of trustees will streamline the process by setting a filing period for candidacy of a trustee district well in advance of the election. The cooperative will in each year: provide notice to the members of the districts open for election by February 15th, take filings of candidates from March 1st to March 10th, and hold an election if needed in that district within 30 days of the annual meeting. An existing trustee that has filed for reelection and is unopposed will continue to hold the seat without a district meeting. Should the existing trustee not file for reelection and there is not a quorum at the district meeting the board of trustees will appoint a member to fill the seat.

To provide transparency, changes are proposed to the requirements for a

quorum of the membership consistent with current state law. The new law allows for registration and voting at multiple locations and times. The cooperative will take advantage this year by having satellite registration locations around the territory; these will count toward a quorum. An established quorum will permit votes from all locations, including the annual meeting, to be tallied.

Lastly, while there are no changes to the number of districts, the removal of former language will allow the boundaries of districts to change for equitable representation of the membership.

The CKenergy board and staff look forward to seeing you at the annual meeting or one of the designated registration sites and thank you for consideration of the bylaw improvements.

Article III

Section 4. Quorum. Five percent of all members, registered and present in person, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at all meetings of the members. If a meeting notice so specifies, in-person registration shall be counted toward the required five percent (5%) of members necessary to constitute a quorum. For purposes of this Section 4, "in-person registration" means the act of registering to vote in person at a location or locations designated in the meeting notice. If less than a quorum is present at any meeting, a majority of those present in person may adjourn/recess the meeting from time to time without further notice, provided, a list of the members present shall be maintained.

Section 6. Trustee Districts. Based upon geographic, regional, population, membership, subdivision, economic development, permanent or full residency, seasonal or partial residency, or other equitable consideration determined by the Board, the Board shall divide the general area in which the Cooperative Pprovides Cooperative Services ("Cooperative Service Area") into twelve districts that equitably represent the individual Members ("Trustee Districts"). Trustee Districts should provide equitable representation on the Board from throughout the Cooperative Service Area.

Periodically, based upon geographic, regional, population, membership, subdivision, economic development, permanent or full residency, seasonal or partial residency, or other equitable consideration determined by the Board, the Board may revise the Trustee Districts to ensure that the Trustee Districts equitably represent the Members. The Trustee Districts provide equitable representation on the Board from throughout the Cooperative Service Area. Within thirty days following a Trustee District revision, and at least sixty days before the next Annual Member Meeting, the Cooperative must notify, in writing or Electronically, Members affected by the Trustee District revision. Trustee District revisions are effective on the date the Board of Trustees approve the Trustee District revision. A Trustee District revision may not: (1) increase an existing Trustee's Term; or (2) unless the affected Trustee consents in writing,

shorten an existing Trustee's Term.

The former Caddo Electric Cooperative service territory shall have nine districts and the former Kiwash Electric Cooperative service territory shall have threedistricts.-

Section 7. Nomination and Election of Trustees. The following procedure shall be followed in the election of trustees: no later than February 15 each year, the Cooperative will provide written or printed notice to the Members stating the specific trustee districts that will be open for election of a trustee in that calendar year; such notice shall provide that any eligible member may file notice of their candidacy for the trustee position using the form available at the Cooperative during the period beginning March 1 and ending March 10 of each year during business hours; the incumbent trustee must file notice if they wish to be a candidate; in the event no eligible candidate other than the incumbent trustee files notice of candidacy within the prescribed time the trustee holding office at that time shall continue in office for the ensuing term; if only one candidate files and is eligible for office, then that candidate is elected; if no eligible candidate files a notice of candidacy, then the trustee vacancy shall be filled in accordance with Article IV, Section 4 herein; if more than one eligible candidate files notice of candidacy then at a meeting of the Board of Trustees not less than sixty (60) days preceding each annual meeting of the members, the trustees shall fix a date which shall not be less than fourteen (14) nor more than thirty (30) days preceding the annual meeting of the members for the holding of a district meeting for the members residing therein in each of the twelve (12) districts requiring an election of trustee for the purpose of electing by ballot, as the law permits, from the members of each district a trustee to serve as a trustee of the Cooperative. The Board of Trustees shall call the meetings and cause notice of each district meeting to be mailed or sent by electronic transmission, as the law permits, by the secretary to each member not less than ten (10) days before the meeting, which call and notice shall indicate the district in which each member belongs. Each district meeting shall be called to order by the trustee or in his/her absence, by any member residing within the district. The members shall then proceed to elect a chair, who shall be someone other than a trustee or potential trustee candidate, and a secretary, each to act for the duration of the meeting. If no election of trustee is necessary in a particular district no district meeting shall be held.

The order of business at the district meetings of the members shall be substantially as follows:

- a) Call to Order.
- b) Report as to the number of members present in order to determine the existence of a quorum.
- c) Election of the Chairperson and Secretary of the meeting.
- d) Reading of the notice of the meeting and proof of the mailing thereof.
- e) Presentation and consideration of reports of officers, trustees, and committees, where applicable.
- f) Election of Trustees
- g) Adjournment

Five (5) percent of the members residing in the district present or accounted for at such duly called district meeting shall constitute a quorum. Members of other districts at the meeting may be heard, but shall have no vote. Voting by proxy shall not be permitted at such district meetings. The member in each voting district receiving the highest number of votes at the election held at such district meeting shall be elected a trustee of the Cooperative to take office immediately following the ensuing annual meeting of the members. The incumbent or any trustee candidate shall not be allowed to tally the votes. A representative of the Board of Trustees, from another district, shall oversee the district meeting process and advise the chair and secretary of the

meeting. Any dispute will be settled by the Board of Trustee representative.

Each trustee shall serve for a period of three years for which they are elected or until his successor shall have been elected and shall have qualified.

The chairman and the secretary of each district meeting shall certify the minutes of the meeting and shall immediately deposit the same with the secretary of the Cooperative and said minutes shall show the name of the person elected a trustee by the district. In the event a quorum is not present at such duly called district meeting the trustee holding office at that time, if such incumbent trustee filed a notice of candidacy, shall continue in office for the ensuing term, if such incumbent trustee is not a candidate, then the trustee vacancy will be filled in accordance with Article IV, Section 4 herein.

The first election cycle shall be in 2016 and shall be in the order stated within the Articles of Consolidation. In 2016, Trustee Districts 2, 4, 9 and 10 shall be in the first election cycle. In 2017, Trustee Districts 3, 5, 8, and 11 shall be in the second election cycle. In 2018, Trustee Districts 1, 6, 7, and 12 shall be in the third election cycle. The three year term rotation shall follow in the order stated above.

Article IV

Section 4. Vacancies. Subject to the provisions of these by-laws with respect to the fFilling of vacancies of trustees caused by the removal of trustees by the members shall be in accordance with Article IV, Section 3 above.,-aAll other trustee vacanciesy-occurring in the Board of Trustees shall be filled by the affirmative vote of a majority of the remaining trustees for the unexpired portion of the term of the trustees in respect of whom the vacancy occurs. The member elected as trustee to fill the vacancy must be eligible and reside in the same district asin which the vacancy occurstrustee to whose office he succeeds.
