YOUTH TOUR

Each year, CKEC sponsors four local high school juniors to participate in Youth Tour, an all-expense paid trip to Washington D.C. through an essay/video competition. Winners visit members of Congress, national monuments, historic sights and Smithsonian museums with Youth Tour winners from cooperatives from across the nation.

ENERGY CAMP

CKEC sends two eighth-graders to Energy Camp hosted by the Oklahoma Association of Electric Cooperatives. The summer camp is held at Camp Canyon near Hinton, OK. A four-day action packed adventure, Energy Camp helps develop leadership skills and promotes teamwork while teaching about cooperative enterprises, the rural electrification program, and electrical safety.

CKEC volunteers each year at the Special Olympics Oklahoma Summer Games. For more than 30 years, co-op employees, directors, managers, and retirees have volunteered with Special Olympics. 2,700 athletes competed in the most recent annual event that was held May 17-19.

CKEC awards 12 senior scholarships to qualifying seniors through the senior scholarship contest.








