Energy Trails 2017

CKEC electrician, Heath Gossen, helps electrify Guatemalan village.

n October 10, a team of electric cooperative employees from all across Oklahoma embarked on a very important mission. They were a part of the Oklahoma Energy Trail's electrification project in the country of Guatemala, specifically the village of Chiis. The team built powerlines and wired homes so that nearly 80 families could receive electricity-for the first time.

Electric cooperatives are known for bringing light to areas that are still "left in the dark." The Oklahoma Association of Electric Cooperatives (OAEC) joined with NRECA International to electrify the poverty stricken village in rural Guatemala. The project consisted of building 1.74 miles of primary line and 1.2 miles of secondary line. This was all done with climbing gear and hand toolsno bucket trucks.

During this year's trip, CKEC's very own Heath Gossen had a very important job. Heath helped make sure that every house that was set to receive electricity, was wired properly. Each of the homes received four lightbulbs (front porch, living room/bedroom, kitchen, & back porch), two outlets, two light switches, one breaker box and one breaker. Heath wasn't alone for the wiring process. He was joined by Tim

Jenlink from Alfalfa Electric Cooperative and also Jimmy Gary, the team's bus driver.

When asked about his experience, Heath said that the first thing a volunteer would see when they walked into a home were smiles—smiles that conveyed hope and the great expectation for light. Heath also said that interacting with the families and kids was an incredible joy.

We are blessed to have Heath as a member of our team and we are so proud of what he was able to help accomplish in Guatemala. "Pictures and words cannot explain how I felt. It almost feels like a dream." – Heath Gossen

Rural Electric Youth Tour

Long standing program still provides the trip of a lifetime.

enator Lyndon Baines Johnson inspired the Youth Tour when he addressed the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) Annual Meeting in Chicago in 1957. The Senator and future president declared, "If one thing comes out of this meeting, it will be sending youngsters to the national capital where they can actually see what the flag stands for and represents."

Consequently, some Texas electric cooperatives sent groups of young people to Washington to work during the summer in Senator Johnson's office. In 1958, a rural electric cooperative in Iowa sponsored the first group of 34 young people on a weeklong study tour of our nation's capital. Later that same year, another bus load came to Washington from Illinois. The idea grew and other states sent bus loads of young people throughout the summer. By 1959, the "Youth Tour" had grown to 130 students.

In 1964, NRECA began to coordinate joint activities among the state delegations and suggested that cooperative representatives from each state arrange to be in Washington, D.C., during Youth Tour week. The first year of the coordinated Tour included approximately 400 young people from 12 states. Word of the program has continued to spread and today, more than 1,500 students and over

250 chaperones participate in the Youth Tour every year.

Youth Tour directors from each state association arrange their delegation's visits to their U.S. representatives' and senators' offices, federal agencies and other educational and sightseeing activities. In addition to the planned statewide activities, the Youth Tour experience encompasses multi-state activities coordinated by NRECA.

Oklahoma students have made that trip seeing sights such as the Smithsonian Institution Museums, the Lincoln Memorial, war memorials, George Washington's Mount Vernon estate, the U.S. Capitol and the White House, to name a few. They have shaken hands with senators and representatives, and some have even seen the president.

Coordination of the 2018 Youth Tour contest is already underway. Deadline for applications is drawing close, February 9th, 2017. High School Juniors, don't miss out on this once in a lifetime trip! Rule and application forms are at your school counselor's office, CKenergy

Small Change, **Big** Difference!

n Tuesday, October 10th, 2017, the CKenergy Electric Foundation Board approved a total of \$36,975 for grants this quarter. Those funds will be used to improve the livelihood of individuals, fund school programs, they will help local law enforcement better protect citizens, and so much more!

Giving to those in need is a great way to tap into the Oklahoma spirit and thousands of Oklahoma's electric co-op members do just that by donating funds yearround through Operation Round Up.

As a member of CKenergy Electric Cooperative, you have the opportunity to participate in the Operation Round Up program. The program works by allowing co-op members to round up their monthly electric bills to the nearest dollar amount. The spare change is transferred to CKenergy's Operation Round Up fund and dispersed to local charitable causes.

For example, let's say you have a monthly electric bill of \$84.62. The bill is rounded up to a flat \$85, with the additional 38 cents going into the Operation Round Up Fund. On average, a co-op member donates roughly \$6 each year. Seems like a small amount, right? It is, but when multiplied by thousands of other CKenergy members, Operation Round Up raises thousands of dollars for local causes.

Operation Round Up funds are used to address important local needs. Local charities, youth groups, schools, fire departments, senior citizen's centers and food banks are just a few of the beneficiaries of Round Up funds. Funds are also used to help needy individuals and families pay for medical equipment and other needs.

CKenergy Electric Cooperative is passionate about the communities we serve. Together, electric co-ops with. Operation Round Up programs in place have raised more than \$100 million since 1989.

Grants are decided by a twelve-member board of cooperative members who volunteer their time to oversee the program. CKenergy Electric co-coordinators are Boyd Lee and Devin Whittington. Requests for assistance are reviewed and evaluated quarterly throughout the year.

We hope you will continue to participate in CKenergy's Operation Round Up. Your small change will change lives, and together we will make a big difference right here in Oklahoma.

Next quarter grant applications must be submitted no later than January 3rd, 2018. Any applications received after the due date will be on the agenda for the next quarterly scheduled meeting.

Generator Safety

Follow these tips to stay safe this winter in the event of an outage.

ortable electric generators can offer many benefits when a long-term electrical outage occurs due to a storm. However, if generators are not used properly, things could turn deadly. Graphic for portable generators.

After Hurricane Katrina, for example, many people relied on generators. But the misuse of them caused five deaths, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The CDC also reported 51 cases of carbon monoxide poisoning.

Follow these tips to prevent misuse of portable electrical generators:

- · Be sure to follow manufacturers' directions for installation and operation.
- To prevent electric shock, make sure your generator is properly grounded. The operation manual should provide correct grounding procedures.
- Operate electric generators or other fuel-powered machines outside where deadly carbon monoxide fumes cannot enter the home.
- Use the generator only in a wellventilated and dry area located away from air intakes to the house. Do not use a generator in an attached garage.
- Do not overload the generator by operating more appliances and

* Only use generators outside, more than 20 feet away from your home, doors, and windows.

equipment than the generator can handle. The operating instructions should have an output rating for the generator.

- Individual appliances should be plugged directly into the receptacle outlet of the generator using appropriately sized extension cords to carry the electric load.
- Make sure the cords are rated for outdoor use, have a grounded, three-pronged plug, and are in good
- Do not run extension cords under
- Never connect generators directly to your home's wiring. The reverse flow of electricity can electrocute an unsuspecting utility worker.
- Never plug a generator into a household outlet.
- Do not refuel a generator while it is running.
- Only store fuel outside of living areas and away from heat sources like water heater pilot lights.
- Turn off all equipment powered by the generator before shutting it down.
- Keep children and pets away from generators.

Baked Chicken Bacon Ranch Taquitos

Ingredients:

1 (8 ounce) pkg. cream cheese 12 slices of bacon, cooked and crumbled 4 cups cooked, shredded chicken 1 (1 ounce) pkt. dry Ranch Dressing mix 2 cups shredded Monterrey Jack cheese 3-4 Tablespoons green onion, chopped 20 (6-inch) flour tortillas Salt, to taste Nonstick cooking spray



Directions:

Preheat oven to 425 degrees F. Cover a large baking sheet with aluminum foil and spray lightly with cooking spray. Mix together cream cheese, bacon, chicken, cheese, and green onions. Add in about 1/2 of the dry ranch dressing mix, or more if desired. Mix well. Spoon 2-3 Tablespoons of the chicken mixture onto each flour tortilla and roll it up. Place taquitos seam-side down on the baking sheet. Repeat about 20 times or until all the filling is used.

Once finished, spray the tops of the taquitos with nonstick cooking spray and sprinkle with salt. Place pan in oven and bake for 15-20 minutes, or until edges and tops are golden. Let cool slightly and serve with ranch dressing or salsa.
