Help Fight Copper Crime

Report suspicious activity near co-op lines or substations.



etal theft continues to plague electric utilities all over the country. Hungry for copper wire, burglars will climb power poles, scale fences, break into buildings, and even attach chains to transformers and meter loops and rip them from the pole with a vehicle– almost always endangering themselves and others in the process.

Over the last four to five months, CKenergy has noticed an increase in copper theft primarily at idle or inactive accounts in parts of eastern Caddo and western Grady counties. Thieves target these places because their crime isn't usually discovered until a substantial amount of time has passed. There have been times when cooperative employees have discovered copper crime scenes simply because the perpertrators caused an outage by breaking the pole they are stealing copper from.

To thieves, stealing copper seems like easy money, but working with any metal and electricity is dangerous—even for co-op employees who are trained and use proper equipment.

Thieves don't understand or care about the potential repercussions of their actions. By stealing copper from co-op poles or substations, they are risking a lot more than a fine or jail sentence—they are risking their lives.

CKenergy urges you to follow these guidlines to help guard against electrical dangers and prevent copper theft.

- If you notice anything unusual with co-op electric facilities, such as an open substation gate, open equipment, or hanging wire, contact us immediately.
- If you see anyone around electric substations or electric facilities other than CKenergy personnel or contractors, call the county sheriff's department or police.
- Install motion-sensor lights on the outside of your home and business to deter thieves.
- Store tools and wire cutters in a secure location, and never leave them out while you are away.
- If you work in construction, don't leave wires or plumbing unattended, or leave loose wire at the job site, especially overnight.

Copper crime costs every CKenergy member by increasing repair expenses and damaging the safety and reliability of your electric service. Help us prevent these thefts by keeping your eyes open as you travel along rural roads. If you notice anything unusual, please call CKenergy Electric Cooperative immediately at 405-656-2322 or call 911 to reach local authorities.

Why is Copper Theft a Problem?

Copper is used in the electric industry to deliver electricity to your home and business, but also is used a grounding system to protect the public and utility workers. When copper is stolen, it compromises the electrical system and can cause injuries.

Consequences of Copper Theft

Copper theft is illegal in all states, and copper theft from an electrical substation may be a federal offense. Not only is stealing copper illegal, but the purchase of copper is illegal where the purchaser knows or has reason to believe that the copper is stolen.

Report Copper Theft

Copper theft is a growing crime that comes with deadly consequences, but it can be combatted with your help. If you have any information about copper theft, please call us at 405-656-2322 or contact your local authorities.

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
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

Through the help of an Angel, he sees how many lives would have been negatively affected if he didn't exist. George comes to realize that, even with his problems, he has a wonderful life with great friends and family.

So what do you think life would be like if community leaders had not founded Caddo Electric or Kiwash Electric, our parent cooperatives, nearly 80 years ago?

Many of the things we take for granted living in the U.S. are much harder and more time consuming for people in developing countries around the world. Oklahoma's electric cooperatives have established a 501(c)3 not-for-profit, the Oklahoma Energy Trails Foundation, to help electrify developing countries.

Oklahoma's first project took place in 2016 with the electrification of two villages in the Amazonian area of Bolivia; the second project electrified a small village in rural Guatemala, near the border with Belize, and this year's project brought first-time access to electricity to two villages. Collectively, Oklahoma's electric cooperatives have made possible 536 firsttime electric connections in five villages in Central America and South America.

We are thankful that our community ancestors right here had the vision and foresight to do for ourselves what needed to be done, gathering our friends and neighbors to form our electric co-op. As the electric business of the 21st century continues to evolve, you can count on CKenergy to meet all of your electric energy needs. More importantly, we are here to help improve the quality of your wonderful life.

Avoid Unnecessary Interruptions in Service

Understand your co-op policy on disconnects.

ervice disconnection is something everyone wants to avoid including your electric co-op. At CKenergy, disconnecting a service for nonpayment is an uncomfortable last resort that occurs only after several attempts are made to notify the account holder of the unpaid balance. Understanding your coop's disconnect procedures may help you avoid service interruptions.

Remember to Update

It's important to keep your account information up to date so you are able to receive notifications from the cooperative about your account, such as payment reminders and usage alerts. To update your account or for more information, call us at 405-656-2322.

The steps to disconnect for nonpayment


- 1. Bills not paid by the due date are assessed a penalty of one and half percent of the balance.
- If the bill is not paid by the due date, the member receives a disconnect notice that is mailed five days after the bill is due.
- Prior to disconnect, the co-op sends out courtesy calls informing the member their account is subject to disconnect.

For more information on your co-op's disconnect policy or other billing procedures, please call 405-656-2322.

- If the bill remains unpaid by the cutoff date, the service is disconnected.
- To reconnect the service, the member must pay their past due balance in full, including any reconnect fees and additional deposits as required.

DO NOT TAMPER WITH YOUR ELECTRIC Meter tampering can result in electric shock, is illegal and increases electricity rates for other co-op members. WATT HOURS Never break a meter seal. Never open a meter base. Never remove a meter or alter an entrance cable in any manner. If you know or suspect that someone has tampered with their meter, please contact us immediately.

Generator Safety

Follow these tips to stay safe this winter in the event of an outage.

ortable electric generators can offer many benefits when a long-term electrical outage occurs due to a storm. However, if generators are not used properly, things could turn deadly. Graphic for portable generators.

After Hurricane Katrina, for example, many people relied on generators. But the misuse of them caused five deaths, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The CDC also reported 51 cases of carbon monoxide poisoning.

Follow these tips to prevent misuse of portable electrical generators:

- Be sure to follow manufacturers' directions for installation and operation.
- To prevent electric shock, make sure your generator is properly grounded. The operation manual should provide correct grounding procedures.
- Operate electric generators or other fuel-powered machines outside where deadly carbon monoxide fumes cannot enter the home.
- Use the generator only in a wellventilated and dry area located away from air intakes to the house. Do not use a generator in an attached garage.
- Do not overload the generator by operating more appliances and

Only use generators outside, more than 20 feet away from your home, doors, and windows.

- equipment than the generator can handle. The operating instructions should have an output rating for the generator.
- Individual appliances should be plugged directly into the receptacle outlet of the generator using appropriately sized extension cords to carry the electric load.
- Make sure the cords are rated for outdoor use, have a grounded, three-pronged plug, and are in good
- Do not run extension cords under
- Never connect generators directly to your home's wiring. The reverse flow of electricity can electrocute an unsuspecting utility worker.
- Never plug a generator into a household outlet.
- Do not refuel a generator while it is running.
- Only store fuel outside of living areas and away from heat sources like water heater pilot lights.
- Turn off all equipment powered by the generator before shutting it down.
- Keep children and pets away from generators.

Crockpot Taco Soup

Ingredients:

1 pound lean ground beef 1 small yellow onion, diced (one cup) 3 cloves garlic, minced 1 cup frozen corn 4oz can diced green chilis 28oz can diced tomatoes, undrained Taco seasoning

Directions:

Combine all ingredients in crockpot and cook on low for 6-8 hours.

Break apart ground beef and stir.

Top with shredded cheese, sour cream, and green onions. Serve with tortilla chips and a fresh garden salad.



Label your freezer bag with the name of the recipe, cooking instructions, and use-by date (three months from when you prepped the meal). To your freezer bag, add all ingredients. (For easier thawing, wait to add the broth the day of cooking.) Remove as much air as possible, seal, and freeze for up to three months. When ready to cook, thaw in refrigerator overnight or in morning in water and and then follow cooking instructions above.
