## Be on the look out for scams

with spelling errors and typos; or an email threatening action unless a sum of money is paid, do not click any links provided within the email, and do not respond to the email. Simply delete the email, or send it to your spam folder.

- If someone calls your home claiming to have discovered a virus on your computer, hang-up. This caller's intent is to access personal information you may be keeping on your computer.

CKenergy wants to make sure you avoid any and all types of scams that could put you or your financial information in jeopardy. If you have any questions or would like more information about how you can protect yourself from scammers, call us at 405-656-2322.

Unfortunately, in today's world, scams are inevitable. Scammers can threaten you with everything from legal action involving the IRS to turning off power to your home.

Utility scams often involve an individual or group posing as an employee of your electric cooperative. The scammer may use threatening language in order to frighten you into offering your credit card or bank account information. Don't fall victim to these types of scams. Understand the threats posed and your best course of action:

- If someone calls your home or cell phone demanding you pay your electric bill immediately, gather as much information as you can from that individual, hang-up the phone and contact the local authorities. Scammers often use threats and urgency to pressure you into giving them your bank account number or loading a pre-paid credit or debit card (such as a Green Dot card). If you have any doubts about your utility

bill, contact our member payment center either in person, or over the phone at 405-656-2322.

- If someone comes to your home claiming to be an employee of CKenergy that needs to collect money or inspect parts of your property, call us to verify they are, in fact, an employee. If they are not, call local authorities for assistance and do not let the individual into your home.

### There are other types of scams consumers should watch out for:

- Government agencies like the IRS will never call to inform you that you have unpaid taxes or other liens against you. You will always receive this type of information in the mail. If someone calls claiming to be the IRS, hang-up immediately.
- If you receive an email from an unknown sender; an email riddled



Here are some tips on how to protect yourself:

- Do not assume the name and number on your caller ID are legitimate. Caller IDs are easily spoofed.
- Never share your personal information, including date of birth, Social Security number or banking information.
- Never wire money to someone you don't know.
- Do not click links or call numbers in unexpected emails or texts—especially those asking for your account information.

# Plunging temps cause higher bills

Heating systems battle to maintain comfort during cold spells

Everyone likes the idea of paying less for utility bills, but resolving to use less energy requires a commitment.

With winter in full swing, now is the perfect time to make energy efficiency a priority in your home.

For some CKenergy members, winter heating costs can be higher than summer cooling costs. That's because the laws of nature dictate how heat behaves on Earth. Remember, heat moves to cool.

On a cold winter day, the heat generated by a heating source is moving through building materials, cracks around doors and windows, unsealed holes created by electrical and plumbing installations, and poorly installed and inadequate insulation.

Futhermore, winter usually doles out a larger temperature difference between the indoor thermostat setting and the outdoor temperature. The greater that temperature difference, the more energy is required to maintain the desired temperature inside your home.

So how do you know if your home is energy efficient? Here's a simple way to find out, based on your average monthly utility usage. Simply multiply the square footage of your home by 10 cents. For instance, a 1,500-square-foot home multiplied by 10 cents (.10) equals \$150.00. A 2,000-square-foot home multiplied by 10 (.10) cents equals \$200. And so on.

Next, calculate your total electric bills for a one-year period. If you heat with natural gas or propane, be sure to add those bills into the total.

Next divide the total by 12 months to establish your monthly average. If your monthly average exceeds the square-footage multiplied by 10 (.10) cents calculation, you could probably benefit from some energy efficient improvements.

## Remember to Update Your Info



At various times and for various reasons, CKEC may need to contact our members. The information that you provide is our source of contact. If that information is incorrect—for example your phone number has changed or you no longer use your post office box, etc.- we have no way of knowing unless you make us aware of the change. If you call in your information, please be prepared to confirm your identity. Also, a correct phone number could be the means of avoiding disconnection of service.

A correct address will help to ensure that you receive your bill. A forwarding address if you move off CKEC lines will help to ensure that you receive your final bill, your deposit and/or membership refund check, if applicable, as well as your capital credit checks when the time comes.

### Did not receive your bill?

Remember that failure to receive your bill in no way relieves you, the member, from paying it. If you do not receive your bill, contact the office billing department before the due date so that another bill can be issued at (405) 656-2322.

## How to Estimate Your Home's Energy Efficiency

To estimate your home's energy efficiency, take your average electric bill and divide it by the square footage of your home. For example, an 1,800 square-foot home with a \$260 electric bill will cost \$0.14 per square foot. \*

$$\frac{\$260}{1,800 \text{ sq. ft}} = \$0.14/\text{sq. ft.}$$

This home would benefit from some energy saving improvements. Calculate your home's cost per square-foot and see how it ranks on the scale to the right.

\*Calculations are based on an all-electric home without a pool or hot tub.



## Energy Efficiency Tip of the Month



Consider insulating your hot water pipes. Doing so can reduce heat loss, allow you to lower the temperature setting and save an additional 3 to 4 percent per year on water heating.

*Small Change, **Big** Difference!*

**O**n Tuesday, January 9th, 2018, the CKenergy Electric Foundation Board approved a total of **\$14,500** for grants this quarter. Those funds will be used to improve the livelihood of individuals, fund school programs, they will help local law enforcement better protect citizens, and so much more!

Giving to those in need is a great way to tap into the Oklahoma spirit and thousands of Oklahoma's electric co-op members do just that by donating funds year-round through Operation Round Up.

As a member of CKenergy Electric Cooperative, you have the opportunity to participate in the Operation Round Up program. The program works by allowing co-op members to round up their monthly electric bills to the nearest dollar amount. The spare change is transferred to CKenergy's Operation Round Up fund and dispersed to local charitable causes.

For example, let's say you have a monthly electric bill of \$84.62. The bill is rounded up to a flat \$85, with the additional 38 cents going into the Operation Round Up Fund. On average, a co-op member donates roughly \$6 each year. Seems like a small amount, right? It is, but when multiplied by thousands of other CKenergy members, Operation Round Up raises thousands of dollars for local causes.

Operation Round Up funds are used to address important local needs. Local charities, youth groups, schools, fire departments, senior citizen's centers and food banks are just a few of the beneficiaries of Round Up funds. Funds are also used to help needy individuals and families pay for medical equipment and other needs.

CKenergy Electric Cooperative is passionate about the communities we serve. Together, electric co-ops with Operation Round Up programs in place have raised more than \$100 million since 1989.

Grants are decided by a twelve-member board of cooperative members who volunteer their time to oversee the program. CKenergy Electric co-coordinators are Boyd Lee and Devin Whittington. Requests for assistance are reviewed and evaluated quarterly throughout the year.

We hope you will continue to participate in CKenergy's Operation Round Up. Your small change will change lives, and together we will make a big difference right here in Oklahoma.

Next quarter grant applications must be submitted no later than **March 28th, 2018**. Any applications received after the due date will be on the agenda for the next quarterly scheduled meeting.

# Insulation Installation Safety Tips



**W**hen tackling home insulation installation on your own, safety should be top of mind. Follow these tips from the North American Insulation Manufacturers Association on safe insulation installation practices.

**Wear appropriate clothing.**

To reduce the chances of skin irritation, wear a head cover, gloves, and loose-fitting, long-sleeved, long-legged clothing.

**Wear proper personal protective equipment.**

Safety glasses and respiratory protection may be necessary, depending on your work environment. The U.S. Occupational Health and Safety Association offers guidelines in its Respiratory Protection Standard that may be helpful.

**Take care if fibers get on your skin or eyes.**

If insulation fibers collect on your skin, don't rub and scratch or remove with compressed air. Instead, lay tape, adhesive-side down, and then remove it gently, so the fibers are pulled from the skin. If fibers get in your eyes, never rub—flush with water or eyewash solution. Contact your doctor if you have continued irritation.

**Keep dust to a minimum.**

Leave the materials in packaging for as long as possible. Use tools that create the least amount of dust; power tools should have dust-collection devices. Put scrap materials in the trash and don't let equipment wander too far from the work site.

**Maintain adequate ventilation.**

Determine whether your work site needs a dust-collection system. Also, exhausted air containing fibers should be filtered before being recirculated into inside workspaces. Finally, ventilation systems used to capture fibers should be regularly checked.



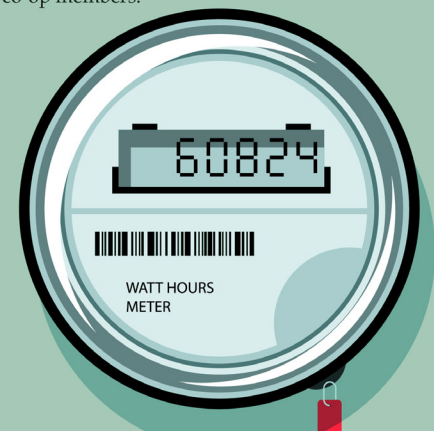
**W**inter ice storms and spring tornadoes can cause massive outages. CKEC has upgraded our phone handling capabilities to avoid busy signals.

## Chicken Parmesean Sliders

### Ingredients:

- 1 Slider buns
- 1 lb Breaded Chicken Tenders \* \*These should be cooked already\*\* (weight is approx.)
- 2 c Pasta sauce
- 2 c Mozzarella cheese , shredded
- 1/2 c Parmesan cheese , shredded
- 3 tbsp Butter , melted
- 1 tsp Garlic powder (more to taste)
- 1 tsp Italian seasoning



### Directions:

Preheat oven to 350°F. Place the bottom half of the slider buns in a greased casserole dish. Place cooked chicken tenders on the bottom buns and then cover them in sauce. Combine the mozzarella and Parmesan cheese and sprinkle it over the sauce. Place the top buns on the sliders. Melt the butter and mix the garlic powder until it is thoroughly combined. Pour the melted butter over the buns and then sprinkle with Italian seasoning. Cover the dish with foil and bake for 10 minutes, then remove the foil and continue baking for another 10 minutes.
