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

Facts about Solar EVERYONE Should Know Part 3

n this installment of "What everyone should know about solar", we're going to look at an actual solar installation on CKenergy lines. We will not be revealing who the customer is but the results are real and are worthy of the attention. As we've said before, it is not the intention of CKenergy Electric Cooperative to dissuade anyone from installing solar panels if it is something they feel strongly about, especially if it is based on their perceived environmental impact. At the same time, we feel it is our responsibility to inform CKenergy members of true and actual results from solar installations, so if your concern is economics, then you can make a more informed decision on how to spend your hard earned money.

Our chosen installation is a roof mounted, 18 kW (18,000 watt), 54 panel system. The total installation cost for this system was \$64,000. After tax incentive of 26%, the installed cost was \$47,360

not counting financing. The installation is on an out building adjacent to the home. The roof position is less than optimal as it is on the west side of the building, 270* azimuth, limiting early day production. It is also on a gentle 3/12 pitch which limits late evening production as well. Nevertheless, decent solar generation is realized from this installation, although not as much as hoped for by the homeowner. Using the PV Watts calculator supplied by the National Renewable Energy Laboratory at www.nrel.org, we have provided an example of the production from this exact installation. See the top graph on page 5.

Notice the daily solar radiation per square meter of panel space changes dramatically from summer months to winter months resulting in considerably different monthly amounts of kilowatt hours produced. Winter time is actually

when utility bills are at their highest and it would be great if the solar installation could offset those costs, but they don't, not even close. Due to the position of the earth and Oklahoma's location within, solar production really kind of falls on its face during those months leaving the homeowner frustrated with the reduction in their utility bills. In fact, in most cases, the utility bill along with the finance payment for the solar system is higher than it was when it was just a utility bill. To be fair, summer bills may be lowered enough by the solar production that the remaining bill plus the finance cost could be cheaper.

So what is the bottom line? The cost after tax credit was \$47,360. Assuming financing at 3% for 15 years, the final cost for the installation is really \$58,870.50. Notice on the chart the annual solar production of 24,444 kwh at 10 cents per kwh would be \$2,445 value to the homeowner. If we divided \$58,870.50 total cost by \$2,445 annual savings we reach a payback of 24 years. The average person gives birth to a child and gets a grandchild in return after 24 years. Most people will have remodeled their homes once or twice in 24 years. How many roofs need to be installed in 24 years?

Not fair you say? Show a more optimal 18kW installation you say? Okay. Just for fun, using the same government calculator let's make this installation state of the art and keep it at the same price. This installation is now mounted in the yard with zero visibility limits. It is at 180* azimuth and a 20* tilt. See the bottom graph on page 5.

Now the savings is \$2,836 per year. Divided into \$58,870.50, the payback is reduced to 20.75 years. That's much better. At least the grandbaby won't have been born yet.

Heating Pads and Electric Blankets Safety

Heating pads and electric blankets cause almost 500 fires each year. Almost all of these fires involve electric blankets that are more than ten years old.

There are two types of personal heating appliances, heating pads that are placed



directly on the mattress and electric blankets. They are not meant to be used interchangeably or at the same time.

Safety Tips:

- Look for dark, charred, or frayed spots or one where the electric cord is cracked or frayed. Replace any worn or old heating pad or electric blanket.
- Do not allow anything on top of a heating pad or electric blanket when it is in use. When covered by anything, including other blankets or pets, electric blankets may overheat.
- Never fold electric blankets when in use. Folded or tucked in blankets. could overheat and cause a fire.
- Heating appliances should never be left unattended or used while sleeping.

Valentine's Day Brownies

Ingredients:

1 cup granulated sugar 2 large eggs ½ cup unsalted butter 4 Tbs. butter 1 tsp. vanilla extract ½ cup flour ½ cup cocoa powder 1/4 tsp. salt ½ cup semi-sweet chocolate chips 1/2 cup M&M's



Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Line an 8x8-inch baking pan with parchment paper or aluminum foil, leave some overhang. If using foil, spray well with cooking spray and set aside.
- 2. In a large bowl, whisk together the butter and sugar. Add in the eggs, making sure to mix well after each one. Mix in the vanilla until combined.
- 3. In a separate bowl, mix together the flour, cocoa power, and salt.
- 4. Add the dry ingredients to the wet ingredients and whisk until well combined. Gently fold in the chcolate chips.
- 5. Pour the brownie mixture ino the prepared baking pan. Evenly sprinkle the M&M's over the top.
- 6. Bake for 25-30 minutes. You will know the brownies are finished when the edges start to slightly pull away and the top looks done.
- 7. Allow to cool completely and cut into squares.
