Making Washington Work for You



lectric cooperatives are deeply connected to the communities they serve and are focused on meeting consumers' energy needs today and into the future. Providing our consumermembers with safe, reliable and affordable power will always be our highest priority, but this requires much more than simply maintaining overhead power lines and other infrastructure.

It requires us to focus on what our elected leaders are doing in Washington to ensure they are acting in your best interest. Here are some of the things we're keeping an eye on in the nation's capital.

RURAL Act

Congress created a problem for electric co-ops when it made changes to the tax code in 2017 that inadvertently put co-ops' tax-exempt status at risk if they receive

government grants. This could stick co-op members with the cost of paying taxes unless Congress fixes the problem. Fortunately, there is a solution. Bipartisan legislation known as the RURAL Act has strong support in Congress, and we're working with lawmakers to pass this important legislation.

Wind Energy

Recently, the U.S. Department of Energy selected the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA)—our national trade association —to research small-scale, community-based wind energy solutions that can be deployed by electric co-ops. This research, to be conducted in partnership with Pacific Northwest National Laboratory, is critical to helping co-ops meet their members' desire for affordable renewable energy solutions.

Carbon Capture

In response to public policy discussions in Washington about ways to reduce emissions, electric co-ops are participating in cutting-edge research to capture and use carbon emissions to make commercial products. This work is under way at the Integrated Test Center, just outside of Gillette, Wyo., where researchers will strive to advance technologies and expand understanding of what's possible in this new arena.

Rural Broadband

Many electric co-ops are working to help close the digital divide by bringing broadband to unserved and underserved areas. NRECA called on Congress to make more funds available for rural broadband deployment. Congress answered the call and funded ReConnect, a pilot program that supports efforts to make broadband possible in rural communities. The first grants were announced late last year, with several co-ops and their communities the beneficiaries.

These are just a few of the ways that electric co-ops are working in Washington to meet the needs of the communities we serve. Because our commitment to you extends far beyond the edge of our service territory.



If that information is incorrect—for example your phone number has changed or you no longer use your post office box, etc.- we have no way of knowing unless you make us aware of the change. If you call in your information, please be prepared to confirm your identity. Also, a correct phone number could be the means of avoiding disconnection of service.

A correct address will help to ensure that you receive your bill. A forwarding address if you move off CKEC lines will help to ensure that you receive your final bill, your deposit and/or membership refund check, if applicable, as well as your capital credit checks when the time comes.

Rural Electric Youth Tour

Long standing program still provides the trip of a lifetime.

enator Lyndon Baines Johnson inspired the Youth Tour when he addressed the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) Annual Meeting in Chicago in 1957. The Senator and future president declared, "If one thing comes out of this meeting, it will be sending youngsters to the national capital where they can actually see what the flag stands for and represents."

Consequently, some Texas electric cooperatives sent groups of young people to Washington to work during the summer in Senator Johnson's office. In 1958, a rural electric cooperative in Iowa sponsored the first group of 34 young people on a week-long study tour of our nation's capital. Later that same year, another bus load came to Washington from Illinois. The idea grew and other states sent bus loads of young people throughout the summer. By 1959, the "Youth Tour" had grown to 130 students.

In 1964, NRECA began to coordinate joint activities among the state delegations and suggested that cooperative representatives from each state arrange to be in Washington, D.C., during Youth Tour week. The first year of the coordinated Tour included approximately 400 young people from 12 states. Word of the program has continued to spread and today, more than

1,500 students and over 250 chaperones participate in the Youth Tour every year.

Youth Tour directors from each state association arrange their delegation's visits to their U.S. representatives' and senators' offices, federal agencies and other educational and sightseeing activities. In addition to the planned statewide activities, the Youth Tour experience encompasses multi-state activities coordinated by NRECA.

Oklahoma students have made that trip seeing sights such as the Smithsonian Institution Museums, the Lincoln Memorial, war memorials, George Washington's Mount Vernon estate, the U.S. Capitol and the White House, to name a few. They have shaken hands with senators and representatives, and some have even seen the president.

Coordination of the 2020 Youth Tour contest is already underway. Deadline for applications is drawing close, February 3rd, 2020. High School Juniors, don't miss out on this once in a lifetime trip! Rule and application forms are at your school counselor's office,

Plunging temps cause higher bills

Heating systems battle to maintain comfort during cold spells

veryone likes the idea of paying less for utility bills, but resolving to use less energy requires a commitment.

With winter in full swing, now is the perfect time to make energy efficiency a priority in your home.

For some CKenergy members, winter heating costs can be higher than summer cooling costs. That's because the laws of nature dictate how heat behaves on Earth. Remember, heat moves to cool.

On a cold winter day, the heat generated by a heating source is moving through building materials, cracks around doors and windows, unsealed holes created by electrical and plumbing installations, and poorly installed and inadequate insulation.

Futhermore, winter usually doles out a larger temperature difference between the indoor thermostat setting and the outdoor temperature. The greater that temperature difference, the more energy is required to maintain the desired temperature inside your home.

So how do you know if your home is energy efficient? Here's a simple way to find out, based on your average monthly utility usage. Simply multiply the square footage of your home by 10 cents. For instance, a 1,500-square-foot home multiplied by 10 cents (.10) equals \$150.00. A 2,000-squarefoot home multiplied by 10 (.10) cents equals \$200. And so on.

Next, calculate your total electric bills for a one-year period. If you heat with natural gas or propane, be sure to add those bills into the total.

Next divide the total by 12 months to establish your monthly average. If your monthly average exceeds the squarefootage multiplied by 10 (.10) cents calculation, you could probably benefit from some energy efficient improvements.

Be a good neighbor

Winter weather can be difficult on elderly loved ones and neighbors. The temperature alone, not to mention wind, ice or snow, can make it hard for senior citizens to get to the doctor, pharmacy and even the grocery store. 
How to Estimate Your Home's Energy Efficiency

To estimate your home's energy efficiency, take you average electric bill and divide it by the square footage of your home. For example, an 1,800 square-foot home with a \$260 electric bill will cost \$0.14 per square foot. *

1,800 sq. ft = \$0.14/sq. ft.

This home would benefit from some energy saving improvements. Calculate your home's cost per square-foot and see how it ranks on the scale to the right.

*Calculations are based on an all-electric home without a pool or hot tub.

Buffalo Brussel Sprouts

The Salty Side Dish

Ingredients:

Buffalo Coating and Seasoning Mix * 1 pound of Brussels Sprouts - halved 3 tablespoons butter

*Recommended for this recipe is Great Value Buffalo Coating and Seasoning Mix from Walmart.



Directions:

Preheat your oven to 400 degrees. Cut your brussels sprouts in half. I find that a serrated knife works best. Put in a strainer and rinse. Lay a piece of parchment paper on a baking sheet. This will keep your buffalo brussels sprouts from sticking to the pan and not burn. Mix your wet brussels sprouts and seasoning together in the bag until fully coated. 1 Pound of veggies can be quite a bit if you use the bag that comes in box so you may need to transfer to a gallon size ziplock or move them around to make sure they are coated. Dump onto your baking sheet and spread out. Bake for approx 13-15 minutes, turning half way in between. You may need UP TO 20 minutes, depending on how large your brussels sprouts are. They should be able to be cut into easily. Now transfer carefully to a bowl and drop in your 3 tablespoons of butter. Stir until butter melts on the sprouts. Serve with dressing or dip.
