Youth Tour Winners Gear Up for Trip

Trip of a lifetime

e are back! The COVID-19 pandemic has impacted our ability to take students to Washington D.C. for the past two years. So, the Oklahoma Electric Cooperatives are excited to take students back to Washington D.C. this summer. Things will look and feel a bit different this year, but the connections and adventures will be life changing.

John Thomas Clinton of Carnegie High School, Mary Horton of Lone Wolf High School, Adrian Leal of Binger-Oney High School, and Alexa Schaufele of Hobart High School will be representing CKEC this summer at the 2022 Youth Tour to Washington, D.C. June 17-23. These students will travel with approximately 70 other students from Oklahoma-those 70 students will have also won their local electric co-op's Youth Tour contest. They will join more than 1,800 other students from co-ops across the nation on a weeklong, all-expense paid trip to tour national landmarks such as Arlington



National Cemetery, Pentagon 9-11 Memorial, Mount Vernon, Holocaust Museum, Library of Congress, and Iwo Jima Memorial. Students will also meet with their congressional representatives, and learn what it means to be an actively involved citizen.

More than a sight-seeing trip, there is a strong educational component that teaches the importance of being an active participant in our democracy. We are excited for the trip to return and look forward to the trip of a lifetime.

In order to reach the finals, the contestants had to be one of the eight highest scores on a written letter/essay. Contestants were required to write a letter of 500-750 words in length. The letter was addressed to anyone of importance on a topic that is important to them. The contest concluded with each student presenting their letter in speech form through a video. Judges scored the students' videos on speaking ability, poise, and projection.



Energy Trails:

Lighting a path in Guatemala

dults and children in the isolated, mountainous village of La Montanita de la Virgen in Guatemala are currently in the dark. The village has never had access to electricity before, but their story will soon change.

The Oklahoma Association of Electric Cooperatives (OAEC) has selected a group of volunteer linemen to electrify La Montanita this coming August. One of the selected team members is CKenergy's own Billy Patterson

"We are proud to send Billy as an ambassador for our co-op and for our state in this mission of providing firsttime electricity to those who have none," says CKenergy Electric Cooperative's CEO Clint Pack. "This type of commitment and concern for community speak to the value of the cooperative difference, which transcends borders."

The electrification project – dubbed

Energy Trails – will be a joint effort between Oklahoma and Colorado's electric cooperatives. The mission will be coordinated through the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association's (NRECA) philanthropic arm, NRECA International.

Providing oversight to the project is the OAEC International Committee. comprised of nine trustees from the statewide association board, which represents 30 electric cooperative member-systems. The committee recently selected a team of 12 volunteers and designated three alternates for the upcoming trip. Four additional volunteer linemen from Colorado will embark on this journey with their Oklahoma counterparts.

"We are grateful for the positive response of Oklahoma co-op linemen who are willing to leave their homes and families for an extended period of time

to empower far-away communities," says OAEC International Committee Chairman Jimmy Taylor. "Access to electricity will bring economic empowerment, better access to health care and enhanced safety for these villagers. It's a life-changing gift."

The project site is located in the department (state) of Jalapa, east of Guatemala City. The volunteer linemen will work for three weeks building powerlines poles, installing transformers and conducting internal wiring of the homes to receive first-time electricity. Upon completion, 76 homes, one elementary school, a health center and one church will benefit from access to electric power.

The team of linemen will work on a stretch of seven miles in mountainous terrain to wire 43 poles and install transformers. Each home will be equipped with lightbulbs, light switches and electrical outlets. The powerlines will be an expansion of service to a local utility.

The following volunteers were selected to serve on the project: Richard Jackson (Alfalfa Electric Cooperative, Cherokee-Okla.), Darren Frazier (Choctaw Electric Cooperative, Hugo-Okla.), Brandon Shirey (Cimarron Electric Cooperative, Kingfisher-Okla.), Billy Patterson (CKenergy Electric Cooperative, Binger-Okla.), Jarrod Hooper (Cotton Electric Cooperative, Walters-Okla.), Jason Childress (East Central Electric Cooperative, Okmulgee-Okla.), Team Leader Damon Lester (Indian Electric Cooperative, Cleveland-Okla.), Shane Stiger (Indian Electric Cooperative, Cleveland-Okla.), Matt Montgomery (Northeast Electric Cooperative, Vinita-Okla.), Brad Hunter (Oklahoma Electric Cooperative, Norman-Okla.), Matt Caldwell (Oklahoma Electric Cooperative, Norman-Okla.), Justin Marsh (Southwest Rural Electric Association, Tipton-Okla.).

Alternates are Jerry Cundiff and Clint Robinson (Central Rural Electric Cooperative, Stillwater-Okla.) and Trevor Howard (Northwestern Electric Cooperative, Woodward-Okla.).

This project marks the fifth electrification project Oklahoma's electric cooperatives have sponsored in Central and South America.

"Bringing electricity to remote areas in developing countries takes electric cooperatives back to their roots. It is an honor to pay it forward," says OAEC General Manager Chris Meyers. "This mission reinforces our commitment to empower generations by improving the quality of life for local communities at home and abroad."

New Ways to Use Electricity

f you listen carefully, you can hear a quiet transformation happening. Electric appliances and equipment are becoming more popular than ever among consumers.

Advancements in technology and battery power coupled with decreasing costs are winning over consumers looking for comparable utility and versatility. A bonus is that use of electric equipment is quieter and better for the environment.

Inside the home, consumers and homebuilders alike are turning to electric appliances to increase energy efficiency and savings. Whether a traditional electric stove or an induction stove top, both are significantly more efficient than a gas oven. That's because conventional residential cooking tops typically use gas or resistance heating elements to transfer energy with efficiencies of approximately 32% and 75% respectively (according to ENERGY STAR*). Electric induction stoves, which cook food without any flame, will reduce indoor air pollution and can bring water to a boil about twice as fast as a gas stove. Robotic vacuums are also gaining in popularity. Fortune Business Insights attributes the growth and popularity of robotic vacuums like Roomba to a larger market trend of smart home technology and automation (think Alexa directing a Roomba to vacuum).

Keith Dennis, an energy industry expert and president of the Beneficial

Electrification League notes that, "A few years back, the list of new electric product categories that were making their way to the market was limited—electric scooters. lawn mowers, leaf blowers and vehicles."

Today, the number of electric products available is exploding.

"There are electric bikes, school buses, pressure washers, utility terrain vehicles, backhoes--even airplanes and boats,"

says Dennis. "With the expansion of batteries and advancements in technology, we are seeing almost anything that burns gasoline or diesel as having an electric replacement available on the market."

Electric equipment also requires less maintenance, and often the biggest task is keeping them charged. In addition, electric equipment is quieter so if you want to listen to music or your favorite podcast while performing outdoor work, you can; something that wouldn't be possible with gas-powered equipment. On the horizon, autonomous lawn mowers (similar to the robotic vacuum cleaners) will be seen dotting outdoor spaces.

Another benefit of using electric appliances or equipment is that by virtue of being plugged into the grid, the environmental performance of electric devices improves over time. In essence, electricity is becoming cleaner through increases renewable energy generation, so equipment that uses electricity will have a diminishing environmental impact over

Propps Retires After 38 Years

Glenn Propps is more than a little bit familiar with electric cooperatives. For the past 38 years, he has devoted

a great part of his life to serving on the Caddo and CKenergy Electric Cooperative board of trustees. The CKEC board accepted Propps' resignation as District 4 trustee at the regular monthly board meeting held May 24th.

A longtime resident of Lookeba-Sickles, Propps' familiarity with the area and his fellow co-op members made him the perfect choice to serve as a director.

"Glenn was a committed member of the board who always weighed his decisions very carefully based on what

> he felt was best for his fellow co-op members," said CKEC CEO, Clint Pack. "He was fiscally conservative, yet always remained open to new ideas. He will be missed."

CKEC's bylaws require CKEC board members to appoint a candidate to fill the remainder of Propps' term. John Scott was appointed after nine

qualified candidates were interviewed. The District 4 term will end in July and will be open for District Election at that time.

Lasagna Roll-Ups

Ingredients:

10 uncooked lasagna noodles 1 package Italian turkey sausage links, casings removed 1 package (8 ounces) cream

cheese, softened

1 jar pasta sauce

1 3/4 cups shredded cheddar

Minced fresh parsley, optional



Directions:

Preheat over to 350 degrees. Cook noodles according to package directions. Meanwhile, in a large skillet, cook sausage over medium heat until no longer pink, breaking it into crumbles; drain. Stir in cream cheese and ½ cup pasta suace.

Drain noodles; spreak 1/4 cup meat mixture on each noodle. Sprinkle each with two Tbs. cheese; carefully roll up.

Spread 2/3 cup pasta sauce into an ungreased 13x 9 baking dish. Place roll-ups seam side down over sauce. Top with remaining sauce and cheese. Cover and bake for 20 minutes Uncover; bake until sauce is bubbly, 10-15 minutes longer. If desired, sprinkle with parsley.
