

Scholarship opportunities for former Youth Tour winners and future engineers

he National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) has two scholarship opportunities-one for former Youth Tour winners and one for students pursing careers in the electrical engineering field.

Youth Tour Alumni Scholarships

The Glenn English National Cooperative Leadership Foundation has awarded over \$100,000 in scholarships to NRECA's Youth Tour alumni since the program's inception in 2014. The Foundation awards one \$10,000 scholarship and four additional \$1,000 scholarships.

To be eligible, application must be a U.S. citizen, be a former participant in NRECA's Washington D.C. Youth Tour program, received academic credits equal to at least one year of college and be working on completing their first undergraduate degree.


Next Generation Rural Engineering Scholarship

Polar Vortex 2021

What does it mean for CKEC members?

et me start by saying, I don't write a monthly article for filler ■in our newsletter because the communications staff has great monthly articles. However, I do write one when it is vitally important for the members to hear the message from me directly. This is one of those times thanks to the February 2021 polar vortex known as winter storm Uri. CKenergy and our power supplier, Western Farmers Electric Cooperative (WFEC), experienced historic electricity demand and historically high costs from gas providers to operate the generation required to meet the needs of the market. The Southwest Power Pool (SPP) had to implement temporary service interruptions to prevent the power grid

from a total collapse. The additional fuel cost during Storm URI resulted in 183 million dollars increase for WFEC to provide service to its' 21 members. CKenergy's portion was \$12,346,915.20. CKenergy secured a loan from our financial partner, CoBank, to pay the cost of keeping the lights on.

What do we do now? We must account for the debt, and we are member owned. so how do we pass the costs on to the membership? Great news! The CKEC board of directors and the management team here have decided that we are NOT going to pass those costs on to the membership, even though some sacrifices will need to be made internally for this to happen. At the beginning of 2021 your cooperative had 33.83% equity but after borrowing the funds to pay for the extra power cost we ended the year with 31.64%. What does that mean to you? CKenergy has a minimum financial ratio requirement of 30% equity established by RUS. Each year when we retire capital credits or borrow funds for capital it lowers our equity. The only way to increase equity is to reduce the debt and increase margins. Because the storm debt reduced our equity, the board will have to closely analyze the cooperatives' ability to retire capital credits and maintain equity as we go forward. In my opinion, it's better to delay capital credit retirements and NOT pass on the storm cost to our members, especially during an already inflationary time.

How is CKenergy one of the only utilities in the state to absorb the total storm cost while other utilities are passing it through to the end users? Here's how it's possible with CKenergy. We are different from the investor-owned utilities such as OG&E

and AEP (PSO) because we aren't profit driven. Our shareholders are each of vou! The consolidation between Caddo Electric and Kiwash Electric to form CKenergy has exceeded all expectations. We are financially stronger and better able to absorb extraordinary costs like the Polar Vortex, while maintaining safe and reliable electricity. Everyone probably had a higher-than-normal electric bill last February, but it was only due to the usage and extra consumption during the bitterly cold storm URI. CKenergy members have not been and will not be charged extra through the power cost adjustment (PCA) for any of the polar vortex related cost. I hope that as a member of CKenergy you can take pride in being one of the only utilities that aren't passing on the extra cost which resulted in gas producers and pipeline companies setting record profits.

Surge Protection 101

power surge is an unexpected increase in voltage, and it can occur from a variety of sources. Regardless of the cause, power surges can majorly damage electronic devices and equipment in your home.

Let's take a look at common causes of power surges and how you can protect your sensitive electronics.

One of the most common causes of a power surge is lightning. Most of us have experienced this during a severe thunderstorm. When lightning strikes an electrical system, the excess current must be channeled somewhere-unfortunately in many cases, it's sent through a home. Your best bet is to unplug all unused devices and electronics during severe thunderstorms.

Another common cause of power surges is electrical overload. This happens when devices or appliances are plugged into an outlet that can't handle the required amount of voltage, or if multiple devices are plugged into one outlet

through an extension cord. If you're experiencing power surges due to electrical overload, it's time to call a qualified electrician to evaluate your home's circuits and electrical needs.

Faulty wiring in a home can also cause power surges. Damaged or exposed wires can cause spikes in voltage, creating a potentially dangerous situation. If you notice signs of faulty wiring, like visible burns on outlets, buzzing sounds from outlets or frequently tripped circuit breakers, your home may be due for electrical wiring repairs and updates.

Surges can also occur after a power outage. Sometimes, when electricity is being restored and reconnected, it's common to experience a quick surge in current. Similar to advice for a surge caused by lightning, it's best to unplug sensitive electronics during the outage--then wait to plug them back in after power is fully restored.

Aside from unplugging devices when you suspect a power surge, there are two ways you can take



additional precautions to protect electronics in your home.

Point-of-use surge protection devices, like power strips, can protect electronics during most surges. But remember, not all power strips include surge protection, so read the packaging label carefully before you buy, and don't overload the power strip with too many devices. You can also install specialized electrical outlets that offer additional surge protection. Talk to a trusted electrician to learn more.

Another option is a whole-home surge protector, which can help protect your home from larger, more powerful surges. In most cases, whole-home suppressors are connected to your home's service panel and include features like thermal fuses and notification capabilities that indicate when a device has been impacted by a surge. Whole-home surge protection prices vary based on the size of the home and suppressor. Whole-home suppressors should always be connected by a licensed electrician, so consider the cost of installation as well.

Occasional power surges are inevitable, but by unplugging devices when you think a surge may occur and using additional levels of protection like power strips or whole-home suppressors, you can better safeguard your sensitive electronics and devices.



A power surge is typically caused by lightning, changes in electrical loads, faulty wiring or damaged power lines.

Install power strips with surge protection to protect sensitive equipment.

- · Easy to use (just plug them in)
- · Protect electronics plugged into the device
- · Must be replaced over time or after a major surge event



REMEMBER:

Not all power strips offer surge protection. Carefully read the packaging labels when purchasing.

French Toast

Ingredients:

1 cup half and half 3 large eggs 2 Tbs. honey, warmed in microwave 1/4 tsp. salt 8 (½-inch) slices day-old country loaf, brioche or challah bread 4 Tbs. butter



Directions:

- 1. In medium size mixing bowl, whisk together the half-and-half, eggs, honey, and salt. You may do this the night before. When ready to cook, pour custard mixture into a pie pan and set aside.
- 2. Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Dip bread into mixture, allow to soak for 30 seconds on each side, and then remove to a cooling rack that is sitting in a sheet pan, and allow to sit for 1 to 2 minutes.
- 3. Over medium-low heat, melt 1 Tbs. of butter in a 10-inch nonstick saute pan. Place 2 slices of bread at a time into the pan and cook until golden brown, approximately 2 to 3 minutes per side. Remove from pan and place on rack in oven for 5 minutes. Repeat with all 8 slizes. Serve immediatly with syrup, whipped cream or fruit.
