Tips to Reduce Energy

Families transition to remote-work and staying at home

s American families and businesses transition to remote-work, they may see a surge in home energy use – and in upcoming electric bills. Simple money-saving steps can help lower monthly electric bills without jeopardizing safety or comfort.

America's electric cooperatives understand the increased financial hardships facing families and businesses due to the economic impact of COVID-19. While CKenergy is working with members who have been directly affected by COVID-19, members will still be responsible for those bills when the pandemic has passed. It's important for families to be mindful of their energy use and consider adjusting certain habits to avoid higher costs later on.

Recommended energy-saving tips include:

• Program your thermostat to maximize energy savings. Setting your thermostat one degree lower when heating or one degree higher when cooling can reduce energy use by up to five percent. • Do full loads of laundry and wash with cold water. Using warm water instead of hot can cut a load's energy use in half, and using cold water will save even more.

• **Air dry dishes.** This step can cut your dishwasher's energy use by up to 50 percent.

• Substitute LEDs for conventional light bulbs. Lighting can amount to up to 12% of monthly energy use. LED bulbs can cut lighting costs by 75%.

• Unplug appliances and electronics when not in use. Small appliances and electronics use energy even when not in use. When powered on, game consoles, televisions and similar electronics are responsible for up to 12 percent of energy use.

Safety is the culture of CKenergy Electric Cooperative. In joining the efforts of our state and federal government in protecting one another from contracting and spreading COVID-19, we are implementing lessons learned from others to slow the spread.

At newsletter press time on April 13, Binger and Cordell office lobbies were closed to the public and the Andarko and Mustang offices were closed. We will continue evaluating the pandemic status to determine when to reopen. Members can conduct business through the drivethru windows at the available locations. We know you rely on safe, reliable electric service, and we will continue doing our best to serve you.

Equally important is the well-being of our employees. We are using good judgment and safety precautions to better serve you. Our high risk employees are working from home. We have separated our line crews from other employees and even from each other to limit possible spread of the virus. Trucks are being relocated so that line workers can head to the job site without coming to the office. If you see our linemen out working please practice social distancing and stay six feet away.

Our management team and board are meeting constantly to fine-tune this plan. We are in constant contact with the other electric cooperatives in Oklahoma and with the Oklahoma Association of Electric Cooperatives, which in turn is working closely with our national association and the state legislature.

We are also utilizing innovative ways to work together from safe spaces, including video conferencing, teleconferencing and more. We are minimizing work-related travel and participation in groups. Co-ops Contribute to a Smarter Grid

t's a familiar scene: poles and wires stretching into the distance alongside a rural highway. This image might appear no different now than it did many years ago. But look more closely.

Invisible to most of us is an overlay of new equipment--chips, sensors and fiber-linking remote distribution infrastructure to the utility's operations center using advanced communications technology.

Those iconic poles and wires are now part of a "smart grid" that can be operated using software and automation.

For electric cooperatives, "digitalization" of electric infrastructure kicked into high gear in 2013 when the U. S. Department of Energy (DOE) funded new technology research at 23 electric co-ops across the country. That partnership has now evolved into a robust research program exploring everything from drones and smart solar inverters to cybersecurity training and carbon capture technology.

Here are some of the ways co-op members are already benefiting from a smarter grid:

• Fewer power outages. In certain situations, smart feeder switching can re-route power around problems such as downed power lines, which

reduces the number of people affected by an outage.

- Pre-pay programs. Most co-op pre-pay billing programs no longer impose hefty reconnection fees because, thanks to advanced digital meters, the co-op doesn't need to send out a truck to physically reconnect the home.
- Cost savings from increased efficiency. Many of the new technologies are improving the efficiency of co-op operations—from reducing the amount of electricity lost in transmission to reducing the need for sending out trucks. These savings are passed on to members.
- Improved safety for co-op workers and the members. The data from smart technologies provide utility operators a more detailed view of what is happening on the electric system. The data can help them identify electrical hazards faster.

While the electricity in your home powers the toaster just as it always did, that electricity is more efficient, more reliable and safer thanks to innovation made possible by cooperation. View, Pay, Create, Update, Alert, Report, Send & Receive?

Make Your Yard Work For You

Smart landscaping can save you money on your energy bill

ocation, location, is the mantra in real estate, but it also applies to your yard when you're looking for ways to lower energy bills. The right tree or shrub in the right place can yield shade, improve the look of your home and produce welcome energy savings.

The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE), claims smart landscaping can, on average, provide enough energy savings to see a return on your investment in less than eight years. Using computer models, the DOE determined that proper placement of only three trees on your property can save an average household between \$100 and \$250 in yearly energy costs.

Now is the time to make your yard work for you. A few simple landscaping considerations can make a big difference in your home's comfort and in the efficiency of your heating and cooling system:

- Use trees and plants to shade a window air conditioner and increase its efficiency by as much as 10 percent. For good airflow and access, position plants more than three feet from your AC.
- Shrubs and trees can form windbreaks that keep wind chill away from a home and lower heating costs. Common turf grass and other low-growing plants are ideal barriers. So are evergreens, especially when combined with a wall or fence to deflect or even lift wind over a home. For best protection, plan on leaving between two to five times the mature height of the trees between the windbreak and the protected home.
- When selecting shade trees, keep in mind the mature height of the tree and the shape of its shade canopy in relation to the height of your home. These factors are important because they should influence how far from

the house you decide to plant a tree. Always avoid planting near underground utility lines or beneath overhead lines.

- Shading takes time a 6-foot to 8-foot deciduous tree planted near a house will begin shading windows in a year. Depending on the tree and the home, the tree will shade the roof in five to 10 years.
- Make planting shade trees due west of west-facing windows top priority.
- Select a tree that can be planted within 20 feet of the window and that will grow at least 10 feet taller than that window. If you have space, use as many trees as needed to create a continuous row along all major westand-east-facing windows.
- Contrary to intuition, the least energy efficient place for a tree is to the south of a house.
- Different trees can serve a variety of purposes. To block summer heat while letting sun filter through in the winter months, use trees that lose their leaves in the winter. Evergreens and shrubs on the other hand, are ideal for providing continuous shade and blocking heavy winds. Other shrubs and groundcover plants can also provide shade, reduce heat radiation and cool air before it reaches our walls and windows.

Easy Chicken and Veggie Stir Fry

Ingredients:

2 zucchini

- 8 oz mushrooms
- 1 cup broccoli
- 1∕₂ onion
- 1 ½ lbs chicken
- 1 chicken bouillon cube
- 1 ½ cup water
- 3 tbs. corn starch+3 tbs+ cold
- water to dissolve in
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp pepper
- 2 tbs butter
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 tbs soy sauce
- additional veggies as desired crunchy chow mein noodles (optional)



Directions:

Dice chicken into small cubes. Heat butter, onion and garlic in a large skillet, over medium heat. Add chicken, salt and pepper. When chicken is mostly cooked through, add soy sauce, water, and bouillon cube. After a couple minutes, add chopped zucchini and mushroom. Dissolve 3 tbs cold water and add to mixture to thicken. When veggies are at desired level of tenderness the meal is ready.
