A Sea of Cotton

person doesn't have to travel all the way to Dixie to find a sea of cotton. No, just take a trip out to the west side of Oklahoma and you'll find all the cotton you ever dreamed of seeing. New gins are popping up to handle the expansion of the cotton industry in Oklahoma.

One such expansion is the new joint venture between the Planters Co-op Gin at Lonewolf and Western Producers Co-op Gin of Dill City. It is currently under construction north of Hobart at the junction of State Hwys 9 and 183. The newly created venture is known as Western Planters LLC, and their new gin is a whopper. Over 7800 horsepower of electric motors as well as a huge propane drying system will be employed to gin tens of thousands of cotton bales each and every year.

As a "cooperative" electric utility, CKenergy is honored to be chosen to serve the electricity to this "cooperative" venture. The Western Planters facility is the kind of load that consumes large amounts of power while ginning, but the ginning season lies entirely within CKenergy's off-peak season. Off-peak usage rewards the customer/member with very favorable rates as well as improving CKenergy's system load factor and leveling or even reducing average wholesale cost of power. This type of load has a positive impact on all CKenergy members.

CKenergy staff and board members worked closely with the decision makers at Western Planters to assure them of CKenergy's service capability for the new gin. You might say the perfect storm occurred making it possible for CKenergy to compete for the new service. Like Western Planters, CKenergy is also a joint venture of two cooperatives. When Caddo and Kiwash Electric Cooperatives consolidated 3 years ago, the staff and the

board approved a new work plan which included tying substations together from each of the old cooperatives to enhance service and provide back-feed capability. The new gin became the impetus to proceed with those efforts while preparing to serve electricity to the gin. As a result, three substations, formerly without substation back-feed, are now connected to serve the future.

Serving the needs of our agricultural community is a constant with CKenergy. Agriculture is the lifeblood of rural America and it was the basis for the formation of electric cooperatives in the early 20th century. Whenever we can serve our rural neighbors with electricity for their gins or other industry needs, we jump on the opportunity. The Staff and the Board of Trustees salute the farmers and patrons of the Western Planters LLC and we look forward to serving you well into the future!



National Co-op Month

Every October since 1930, not-forprofit cooperatives of all stripes have celebrated Cooperative Month. During this time, it makes sense to highlight the qualities that make electric cooperatives from other types of utilities and businesses.

Without members, there would be no cooperatives.

Electric co-ops are:

- Private, independent, nonprofit utility businesses.
- Owned by the members they
- Incorporated under the laws of the states in which they operate.
- Established to provide at-cost electric service.
- Governed by a board of directors elected from the membership, which sets policies & procedures that are implemented by the co-op's management.

You Can Afford to "Go Geo"



veryone knows that geothermal heat pumps save you plenty of money, but the cost to "go geo" can be prohibitive for many homeowners. CKenergy's innovative geothermal program can help take care of that problem.

Geothermals utilize the natural heating and cooling power of the Earth to save you money year round. Like any type of heat pump, it simply moves heat energy from one place to another. A geothermal heat pump is like a refrigerator because they work using the same scientific principle. By using refrigeration, the geothermal heat pump removes heat energy stored in the earth and/or the earth's groundwater and transfers it to the home.

Members who participate in the program receive a cash rebate of \$1000 per ton on geothermal heat pumps. CKenergy's geothermal loop program provides members a free loop that is installed and maintained by the co-op. All participating

geothermal members also receive a professional home energy audit free of charge after completed geothermal installation.

These advantages add up to drastically reduced costs on geothermal heat pumps for co-op members as well as monthly savings they will enjoy on their electric bill. According to Energy.gov., geothermal heat pumps typically use 25 to 50 percent less electricity than conventional heating or cooling systems.

CKenergy has approximately 800 geothermal systems installed across our system. This includes three geo-exclusive housing additions as well as new homes and retrofit homes.

Geothermal FAQ's

What is a geothermal heat pump?

A geothermal or "ground-source" heat pump is an electrically powered device that uses the natural heat storage ability of the earth and/or the earth's groundwater to heat and cool your home or business at very high efficiencies.

How does it work?

Like any type of heat pump, it simply moves heat energy from one place to another. A geothermal heat pump is like a refrigerator because they work using the same scientific principle. By using refrigeration, the geothermal heat pump removes heat energy stored in the earth and/or the earth's groundwater and transfers it to the home.

Do I need separate geothermal ground loops for heating and cooling?

No, the same loop works for both. When changing from heating to cooling, or vice versa, the flow of heat is reversed by a mechanism inside the unit.

Where can this loop be located?

That depends on land availability and terrain. Closed-loops are trenched horizontally in yards adjacent to the home if the yard is large enough. Or, for smaller yards, the loops can be installed vertically using a drill rig, much like a water well installation

Fall into Energy Savings

As scarves and light jackets leave closets this fall, be ready to cut the chill and your energy bill with these seasonal tips:

- Set your thermostat no higher than 68 degrees and be sure to lower the temperature when you go to bed or are not at home. This saves money and keeps you warm.
- During the day, open shades and curtains to allow solar heating. Close them at night to retain the day's heat.
- Check your home's weather stripping for air leaks around doors, windows, baseboards, and wherever pipes, wires, and vents enter the house. Make sure the warm air you paid for won't escape.
- Have your heating system serviced by contractor who has a certification through the North American



Technician Excellence (NATE) program, and replace furnace filters at least once every three months. Clean filters once a month during the heating season to keep the system at peak performance.

Cheesy Meatball Cups

Ingredients:

2 (8 ounce) cans crescent dough flour for dusting 5 ounces Cacique® Queso Quesadilla Jalapeño, shredded 16 frozen meatballs 1/2 cup garlic spaghetti sauce 1 tablespoon fresh parsley, finely chopped



Directions:

Preheat oven to 350° F. Prepare two muffin tins with (16 molds total) with non-stick cooking spray. Extend dough on a lightly floured surface. Pull apart dough triangles and press each inside a muffin mold. Covering the bottom of mold and pressing up the sides. Sprinkle each dough cup with 1 teaspoon shredded cheese. Place a meatball on top of cheese, lightly pressing into the dough. Bake for 10 minutes. Remove from oven and top with 1 teaspoon of sauce and 1 teaspoon shredded cheese. Place back in the oven and bake for 10 minutes more or until dough is golden brown and the cheese bubbles. Serve with a sprinkle of fresh parsley.
