2020 Annual Meeting Highlights

ue to COVID-19 pandemic precautions, CKenergy Electric Cooperative held a non-traditional, modified Annual Meeting of Members on Friday, July 31 at the Pioneer Cellular Event Center in Weatherford.

Drive-thru registration began at 10:00 a.m. at the Pioneer Cellular Event Center Registered members received a \$20 bill credit on their electric account.

CKEC appreciates our members' understanding in our choosing to uphold one of our seven guiding Cooperative Principles-Concern for Community. CKEC's board and staff want to thank our members for their patronage and their understanding of the method of this year's Annual Meeting.

The economic impact of the pandemic is evolving as well. CKenergy is a memberowned cooperative that was built by and belongs to the consumers we serve. The economic health of CKenergy is directly tied to the wellbeing of our communities. We are seeing an increase in unpaid electric bills as local businesses struggle and unemployment surges. We expect the decline of the oil and gas industry to have a significant and long-term effect on many businesses we serve and the people they employ.

Maintaining minimal margins helps us keep our energy costs as low as possible, but this leaves a very limited reserve for us to sustain high rates of nonpayment and reduction in revenue from closed commercial accounts. As a not-for-profit electric cooperative, CKEC regularly returns excess margins to our members. We do not have shareholders and any excess margins we have will always be returned to our members.

The CKenergy Board of Directors and staff share in the responsibility of providing certainty during this uncertain time. CKEC will continue to be proactive as we work to keep the lights on and provide quality service to local families and businesses. The reliable, affordable electricity that we provide will help power economic recovery. By being proactive, CKEC can continue vital work without undue financial burden to our members or rate increases on those we serve.

According to research by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association, the nation's electric cooperatives could suffer up to \$10 billion in lost revenue through 2022 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The coming months will more fully reveal the economic impact this will have on CKenergy and our members.





You have the Power with Prepaid

You can control what you pay and know what uses watts



repaid metering is as simple as it sounds: consumers pay for electricity before it is used, then use the electricity until the credit expires. A terrific analogy for prepaid metering is putting gas in your car. Say you only have \$30 for the week to pay for gasoline. You drive down to the station, pump in \$30 and drive off. As you drive during the week, what happens? You monitor the gauge and make sure each trip is necessary. If you drive too much, you burn

up your \$30 before the week is out. Literally, by checking the gauge throughout the week, you became more prudent with your gas use and made informed decisions on when and how much to use.

Now let's transfer that analogy to your account with CKenergy. With normal metering, you get a bill after you have used the electricity. Sometimes it comes as a shock. "How could I possibly have used so much electricity?" Prepaid metering is designed to ease - and hopefully eliminate that shock. Let's take a look at how it works.

The components of a prepaid metering system aren't too different from regular metering. Two extra pieces are required; a way to turn off the power when all your money is used and a way for CKenergy to tell you how much you have left in your account; think of this as your "electricity tank gauge." On the cooperative's side, we handle the extra software and processes.


Now let's see it in action. You have the prepaid metering equipment installed. Prepaid users often receive electricity use notifications through a smartphone app, emails and text messages.

Now you decide how often you want to buy electricity. Monthly? Weekly? Then you budget for a certain amount of power and pay the co-op. You can pay online, at any of our district offices, and through the CKenergy EC app. Bingo, your electricity tank is full.

During the time period you have paid for (let's say a week for this example), you receive regular feedback on how much you have left in your tank.

As you approach "empty," you add more money to your account and are then set for the next period. If you run out, the power goes off just like your car stops when it runs out of gas. To complete the analogy, let's look at what you have been doing during the week. You become quite aware of how you are using electricity. You turn things off more often. You may change the setting on your thermostat so you don't cool or heat as much. You might cook outside to avoid using the oven or make sure your dishwasher is really full before running it. Industry studies show that consumers who participate in prepaid metering plans use as much as 10 percent less electricity than their counterparts.

Prepaid metering teaches the value of electricity, what uses watts in your home, provides absolute control over how much you pay and helps you reduce your energy use. It is a tremendous way to power your life. Contact us at 405-656-2322, to learn more about prepaid metering.

Kids on their own?

Prepare them with electrical safety lessons

f back to school means your children will be walking without you or coming home to an empty house for a few hours in the afternoons, remind them that electricity can be dangerous.

Here are six lessons that can save a little one's life:

 Assume all utility lines are energized and can injure or kill someone who touches them. Even if the line

- appears to belong to the cable or phone company, a child is unlikely to be sure. Advise your kids not to touch any kind of fallen line.
- c. Climbing trees is an activity best enjoyed when an adult is nearby to supervise. Still, caution your child not to climb a tree that is near an electrical power line-even if the line isn't touching the tree.

- 3. Likewise remind your kids to fly kites and toy airplanes far away from power lines and substations, and to leave them where they land if they come into contact with a wire. Admonish them to abandon any toys that could wind up inside a protected area around a transformer or substation.
- 4. Insist that children stay away from transformer boxes, substations, transmission towers and all electrical equipment. Forbid them from climbing utility poles or entering a substation-no matter who dares them to ignore the "do not enter" sign and climb over the fence.
- Teach children of all ages how to read signs that say "danger," "high voltage," and "keep out."
- 6. Write down the CKenergy Electric Cooperative telephone number for each of your children to keep with his or her school books, and encourage them to all for help if they spot a downed wire or see another child dangerously close to a line or other potentially "live" equipment. If for some reason they can't locate the CKenergy number, tell them to call 911 immediately. The CKenergy number is **1-800-868-8243**.

Barbeque Beef Cups

Ingredients:

3/4 pound lean ground ½ cup barbeque sauce 1 tablespoon dried minced onion 1 (12 ounce) package refrigerated biscuit dough ⅓ cup shredded cheddar cheese



Directions:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Grease the cups of a muffin pan. In a large heavy skillet over medium heat, cook beef until evenly brown. Drain excess fat. Stir in barbeque sauce and dried onion. Simmer for a few minute over low heat. Flatten each biscuit, and press into cups of the prepared muffin pan. Make sure dough comes to the top of the pan. Spoon a portion of the meat mixture into each dough cup. Bake in preheated oven for 12 minutes. Sprinkle with cheese, and bake for three more minutes.
