# **Understanding Power Surges and Blinks**

Common power disruptions explained

ave you ever noticed your lights blink during a thunderstorm? Or perhaps you have noticed a blinking microwave clock when you arrive home. When this happens, you've likely experienced a brief disruption to your electric service, which could result from a power surge or blink. While the symptoms of surges and blinks can appear similar, what's happening behind the scenes can be quite different.

## What's a power surge?

Power surges are brief over voltage spikes or disturbances of a power waveform that can damage, degrade, or destroy electronic equipment within your home or business. Most electronics are designed to handle small variations in voltage; however, power surges can reach amplitudes of tens of thousands of voltsthis can be extremely damaging to your electronic equipment.

Surges can be caused by internal sources, like HVAC systems with variable frequency drives, or external sources, like lightning and damage to power lines and transformers.

CKenergy Electric Cooperative encourages all members to install surge protective devices (such as surge protector power strips) to safeguard your sensitive electronics. If you're experiencing frequent surges in your home or business and you believe the cause is internal, contact a qualified electrician to inspect your electrical system.

### What is a power blink?

Power blinks are also brief service interruptions, but they are typically caused by a fault (short circuit) on a power line or a protective device that's working in reaction to the fault. Faults can occur through a variety of instances, like squirrels, birds or other small animals contacting an energized power line; tree branches touching a power line; or lightning and other similar events.

Any of the events noted above can cause your power to blink, but you may also experience a brief interruption when protective devices that act like circuit breakers are working to detect the fault. Believe it or not, these brief power blinks caused by protective devices are good because that means the equipment is working as it should to prevent a prolonged outage.

Regardless of the cause, CKEC crews will be on their way to inspect the damage and make necessary repairs after a power outage. And you can help too. Whenever you experience an outage, please let us know by using our mobile app to report it or by calling our outage hotline number at 1-800-8OUTAGE.

# **Investing in our future**

Co-op tax dollars contribute more than \$1,600,000 to local education

It's back to school time! The importance of a good education is vital and CKenergy Electric Cooperative has been a long-time supporter of school districts within our service territory.

CKEC provides financial support to school systems in our service territory through the payment of gross receipt taxes. The 2% gross receipts tax is collected from members' monthly electric bills at the instruction of the Oklahoma Tax Commission. Ninety-Five percent of the funds remitted are paid to the school districts in our service territory while 5% is placed in the state's general fund.

In 2021, CKenergy paid \$1,603,604.92 in gross receipts tax. These funds benefited local schools in CKEC's service territory.

The chart to the right shows the allocation of school funds in CKEC's area. Tax distribution varies from school to school because some school districts have more miles of CKenergy electric lines.

Electric cooperatives are not-for profit businesses. Cooperatvies don't pay income tax, but we pay several taxes businesses are required to pay.

Contributing to the education of our youth is an important benefit of our tax dollars. It's an investment in our communities and our future.

On a percentage basis, electric cooperatives and their members contribute more tax dollars to local school districts than other utilities.

## **Grandma's Ground Beef Casserole**

## **Ingredients:**

1 lb. ground beef

2 can tomato sauce

1 tsp. white sugar

1 tsp. garlic salt

1 tsp. salt

1 (8 ounce) package egg noodles

1 cup sour cream

3 oz. cream cheese

1 large white onion, diced

½ cup shredded sharp cheddar



### Directions:

Heat a large skillet over medium-high heat. Cook and stir ground beef in the hot skillet unbil browned and crumbly, 5 to 7 minutes; drain and discard grease. Mix tomato sauce, sugar, garlic salt, and alt into the ground beef; simmer until flavors blend, about 20 minues. Remove from the heat, cover the skillet, and cool to room temperature.

While the sauce is cooking, bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil. Cook egg noodles in the boiling waer, stirring occasionally until cooked through but firm to bite.

While the egg noodles are cooking, preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Greast a 9x13inch casserole dish. Mix sour cream, cream cheese, and onion together in a bowl.

Layer ½ of the egg noodles into the prepared casserole dish. Top with ½ of the sour cream mixture, then ½ of the ground beef mixture. Repeat layers. Sprinkle cheese over top. Bake in the preheated oven until cheese is melted and golden brown, 25 to 30 minutes.
